Purpose and Content

The Office of Institutional Effectiveness at Craven Community College (the College) annually prepares and publishes the Fact Book as a longitudinal, multi-year compilation of basic statistical data regarding operations at the College. The Fact Book is compiled to provide faculty, staff, and administration with a centralized, single-source reference of frequently used information for internal planning and decision-making purposes.

Unless otherwise noted, data presented in this Fact Book are derived from *Ellucian Colleague*, the College's official student information system.

Institutional Effectiveness staff extract data from Colleague through Informer IV reports and/or the North Carolina Community College System (NCCCS) Data Dashboards, ensuring that reporting aligns with state and federal reporting standards. Data represent official census dates or reporting periods as defined by the NCCCS, unless otherwise specified.

Additionally, some tables and graphs in the Fact Book were prepared from data provided directly from individual departments at the College – i.e., the Business Office, Facilities, Financial Services, Financial Aid and Human Resources. Other data were taken from the state's Performance Measures for Student Success. Finally, there is a section on Craven County Profiles where data was taken directly from county source documents and from the U.S. Census Bureau.

Five-Year Data Trend

The five years of referenced data for the 2024-25 Fact Book include academic years (AY) 2019-20, 2020-21, 2021-22, 2022-23, and 2023-24. The Office of Institutional Effectiveness attests that the data and statistics contained in the Fact Book are accurate and precise; however, the College and the environment in which it exists are continually changing, and the information presented may change in response. Further, data presented in this official publication may differ from statistics found in other reports, due to differences in the source information, dates of data generation, and/or reporting periods.



Unduplicated headcount refers to the total number of students (both full- and part- time) enrolled in at least one course during an AY. Each student is counted only once during that time period, regardless of the number of classes the student takes or the number of semesters for which the student registers for at least one course. The College experienced the largest decrease in unduplicated headcount from AY 2019-20 to AY 2020-21, with a decline of 8.1%. However, since that time period, the overall unduplicated headcount has begun to increase, with the most recent increase of 4.1% from the 2022-23 AY to the 2023-24 AY.


Courses and Student Count

Due to the stricter capacity rules of Health and Career Program courses, the information below focuses exclusively on General Education courses. The average number of students per class remains low, with 13 students per class for the AY 2023-24. Overall student enrollment in General Education courses decreased 3.6% from AY 2022-23 to AY 2023-24. There has been a decrease in the number of General Education courses offered during an AY dropping by 7.6% from AY 2019-120 to AY 2023-24.

Student: Faculty Ratios





Full-Time faculty in Liberal Arts, Business, Education, Criminal Justice, Information Technology, and Nursing disciplines shall normally assume an 18 - 20 instructor contact hour faculty workload per semester, or 36 - 40 contact hours per academic year. Full-time faculty in Industrial, Cosmetology, Transportation and Allied Health disciplines shall normally assume a 21 - 24 instructional contact hour faculty workload per semester, or 42 - 48 contact hours per academic year.


Enrollment by Gender

The majority of curriculum students at the College are female, comprising 59.1% of the student body, which represents 2,260 students. This value represents a slight increase over last year's figure (4.7%). In AY 2023-24, there were 1,566 male students enrolled, constituting 40.9% of the total curriculum student population.


Enrollment by Age Groups

At 43.1%, the largest percentage of students at the College are between the ages of 20 and 29. The average age of a curriculum student is approximately 24 years old. The youngest student is 14 years old, and the oldest is 85. While the largest percentage of students at Craven are between the ages of 20 and 29, students under the age of 19 continue to be the age demographic with the highest growth rate. In 2019-20, students under the age of 19 accounted for 28.2% of the total student population, whereas in 2023-24, they accounted for 37.9% of the campus population. Students under the age of 30 comprise 81.0% of the curriculum population.


Enrollment by Ethnicity


Enrollment by Employment Status

The percentage of curriculum students employed in some capacity (either full- or part-time employed) has remained stable across time with 48.2% of curriculum students reporting being employed in AY 2019-20 compared to 45.3% of students in AY 2023-24. Additionally, the number of curriculum students reporting being unemployed has also remained stable across time with 50.7% reporting unemployment in AY 2019-20 compared to 53.7% in AY 2023-24.


Enrollment by Geographic Region





Overall, there has been a decrease in curriculum student enrollment by Active Duty Military personnel and Military Dependents. The number of enrolled Active Duty Military curriculum students has decreased by 43.6% from AY 2019-20 to AY 2023-24. The number of curriculum students who identify as Military Dependents has decreased by 45.9% from AY 2019-20 to AY 2023-24.

Enrollment by Full-Time/Part-Time Status



Total enrollment (both full- and part-time students) has remained relatively stable over the past five AYs, with only a 4.3% change in the total number of enrollments from AY 2019-20 compared to AY 2023-24. The biggest change has been a decrease of full-time students, which has been mirrored by an increase in part-time enrollments. Full-time enrollments have dropped by 29.7% from AY 2019-20 compared to AY 2023-24, while part-time enrollments have increased by 9.2% over that same time period.

Enrollment by Class Location





The New Bern campus has suffered a decline in enrollment, with a decrease of 19.7% from AY 2019-20 to 2023-24. Both the New Bern and Havelock/Cherry Point campus enrollments have stayed relatively stable from AY 2021-22 to 2023-24. Over the past five years, enrollment in off-campus courses has been relatively consistent.


FTE by Delivery Method


Enrollment by Program Area


Completions by Program Area



During the AY 2019-20, 27.3% of the local high school graduates had enrolled at the College within one year of graduation. During the AY 2023-24 23.9% of the local high school graduates had enrolled at the College within one year of graduation.



The objective is for these students to graduate, transfer, or remain enrolled with 42 successfully completed non-developmental hours during their fourth year. Based on a cohort from Fall 2019, the College reported in AY 2023-24 that 55% of students graduated, returned, or transferred using the state's methodology. 



Enrollment by Gender



Enrollment by Ethnicity



Enrollment by Employment Status










Enrollment by Gender


Enrollment by Ethnicity

Enrollment by Employment Status





Faculty/Staff by Employment Classification







Full-Time Regular Staff by Years of Service




